

UST maintains four-star QS rating;



he world's largest international higher education network, Quacquarelli Symonds (QS) has once again rated the University of Santo Tomas four stars, cementing UST's place as the highestrated University in the Philippines for 2017.

In 2015, UST became the first and only institution in the Philippines to achieve such a four-star rating.

This year, according to UST Quality Management Office Director Joehanna K. Ngo, QS renewed UST's four-star rating, noting an improvement in two categories, Research and Internationalization, which increased by one star each.

Currently, the University holds fivestar ratings in four out of eight categories: Facilities, or the quality of university infrastructure; Employability, which focuses on the work-readiness of graduates; Social Responsibility, or advocacies and community development such as charity work and disaster relief; and Inclusiveness, or the accessibility of the University to students who are differently abled or from low-income families.

UST also garners a four-star rating for the Teaching category, which assesses student feedback through an in-house Student Satisfaction Survey (SSS), which is open to all the tertiary level students, further study rate and student faculty ratio, and in the Internationalization category, which measures the proportion of international students and staff, the numbers of exchange students arriving and departing, the number of nationalities represented in

the student body, the number and strength of international partnerships with other universities.

For its Research category, the Londonbased consultancy also gave the University a three-star rating which assesses the number of papers published and the number of times the scholarly outputs are cited and awarded, and a one-star rating for this year's specialist criteria, the subject ranking and program strength in the field of "Hospitality and Leisure Management"

Its overall four-star rating, according to the Top Universities section of the QS website, indicates that the University of Santo Tomas is "highly international, demonstrating excellence in both research and teaching. The institution provides an excellent environment for students and faculty."

In the previously announced 2018 Top Asian University rankings, UST has surged to the 145th spot.

UST also became one of the nation's top two universities in terms of graduate employability by joining the 251 - 300 bracket of the 2018 QS employability rankings.

QS operates within the understanding that Universities have distinct strengths and caters to different student needs, and so universities are evaluated across multiple categories. The QS Stars system evaluates institutions based on their performance against set standards in specific areas, which is then averaged into its overall score.

Ong, Flores attend QS-APPLE Conference in Taiwan; Ong co-chairs session 5

SEAN Engr. Nestor R. Ong, Assistant Director of the Quality Management Office and Mr. Vien Vic G. Flores, QMO Auditor, attended the three-day 13th QS-APPLE Conference and Exhibition as delegates of the University of Santo Tomas (UST). Ong was the sole IAAC (International Academic Advisory Committee) Member from the Philippines. He also acted as co-chair in Track 5: Building a Global University Brand,

In Track 5, the topics were: Session 5.1: Using World University Ranking to Build a Global Brand, Session 5.2: Building a Global Brand through Student Engagement, and Session 5.3: Innovative Approaches to Building a Global Brand, participated by presidents, CEOs, academic officials and administrators from different ASIA-Pacific universities including the presidents of three Philippine universities such as MAPÚA University, Lyceum of the Philippines University, and Southville International School and Colleges.

The annual QS-APPLE conference was prefaced by a welcome dinner where an opening folklore performance by student representatives of the various Taiwanese tribes and the Chio Tian drumming group were presented. This was followed by the delivery of welcome addresses and a keynote from Prof. Nigel Healey, Conference Programme Chair and Vice Chancellor of Fiji National University, Dr. Wen-Hwa Lee, Chancellor of China Medical University and Dr. K.S. Clifford Chao, Vice President of China Medical University.

This year's conference convened close to 400 academics from 143 institutions in 30 countries, with 69 papers presented during the plenary and parallel sessions. There were exhibitors from various universities around the world that showcased their universities' offerings to participants at the QS Hub -Exhibition. UST was one of the exhibitors whose foreign visitors expressed their interest in developing partnerships with the University through a memorandum of understanding.

There were 21 delegates from the Philippines representing seven universities: UST, Mapúa University, Malayan Colleges Laguna, Lyceum of the Philippines University, Southville International School & Colleges, University of Perpetual Help System Dalta, and University of the Philippines Diliman.

As part of the program activities, Ong was chosen to give a testimonial through video interview about the success of the conference. Ong said, "QS-APPLE is a good avenue to internationalize among ASIA-Pacific universities by providing valuable opportunities for networking, exchanging best practices, and debating the new development in higher education."

Ong was well-recognized among the Philippine delegates by his co-IAAC member, Prof. Liang-Yo Yang, Ph.D., Dean and Professor of the Office of Global Affairs at the China Medical

University Taiwan during the Campus Tour in their university. He likewise promised to visit UST in his future travel trip to the Philippines.

During one of the keynote addresses, Dr. Clifford Chao discussed "Artificial Intelligence in Medical Education" and pointed out the need for educators to identify with artificial intelligence (AI) and how this technology will alter the learning methods of future generations, and how (the academe will) prepare students for the ever-evolving medical service paradigm.

Prof. Ping-Cheng Yeh talked about Gamification + Peer-to-Peer (P2P) Teaching & Learning, where he addressed some of the most challenging issues faced by educators today and shared his solution in keeping students engaged in class and making them motivated

to learn. During his presentation, Prof. Yeh explained how his award-winning gamification scheme and other P2P schemes work for different courses and demonstrated the fascinating outcome from his students' coursework.

At the inaugural "QS Forum: Focus on East Asia," Prof. Kingsley Bolton kicked off the session with discussion of the topic the dynamic and high-performing higher education system in East Asia.

East Asian universities' enrollment rate are amongst the highest globally, and this is affected by the following factors: (1) investment in higher education driving rapid economic growth in the region (2) proactive government policies aimed at the enhancement of leading research institutions (3) an ageing population placing downward pressure on university enrollment (4) heightened interest by the higher education institutions within the region to increase international student numbers to fill the demographic gap. A second panel discussion on the state of higher education in East Asia will be organized at the 14th QS-APPLE conference to be held in 2018.

During the colloquium session, Prof. Nigel Healey led the discussion on "Leading a Young University to Success," participated in by representatives of some of the voungest and most dynamic universities in the Asia-Pacific. Participants shared their experiences and strategies to succeed in today's competitive environment within the higher education sector.

Towards the conclusion of the conference was the QS University Rankings Masterclass, a 90-minute panel discussion where participants learned about the latest edition of the QS Employability Rankings, its new methodology and the latest Scopus data presented by speakers such as Ben Sowter (QS), John O'Leary (Times Good Universities Guide) and Yoshiko Kakita (Elsevier). The outcome of QS BRICS University Rankings 2018 was also released during the 13th QS-APPLE conference.

The 14th QS-APPLE Conference and Exhibition will be held in Seoul. Korea in November 2018, in partnership with Chung-Ang University.

Miss Farth 2017 talks on environmental advocacies, Thomasian values at UST meet and greet



lewly-crowned Miss Earth 2017 Karen Ibasco shared her thoughts and advocacies N on renewable energy and climate change in a meet and greet with Thomasian student iournalists event held on December 1 at the University of Santo Tomas (UST) Museum.

When asked about her advocacy on renewable energy and how she can make it attractive to the public. Ibasco, a Thomasian alumna who graduated from the College of Science with a degree in Applied Physics, cum Laude, and the UST Graduate School with a Master's degree in Applied Physics major in Medical Physics, cum Laude, and former College of Science faculty member mentioned the effects of global warming in the present time and how it would affect the future generations.

"The use of fossil fuels is the major factor why there are a lot of greenhouse gases in the atmosphere that cause the thickening (of the atmosphere). And when the sun hits it, the earth's temperature rises and now you're experiencing

global warming and climate change. You cannot turn a blind eye to it because it's being experienced all over the world. The Philippines is very much vulnerable to climate change," lbasco said.

"If you don't act now, you're really going to prepare for a hotter world and more catastrophic effects and that's for sure. You're doing it for the next generation and not just for yourself," she added.

Ibasco was also asked on how she can incorporate her environmental advocacy with the Thomasian values that she had acquired in her stay in UST. The Miss Earth 2017 winner cited the three Thomasian core values in her answer.

"It may sound cliché, a lot of people will say that when you're a Thomasian you always say the

three C's. but it's very true. Those are the things I actually brought with me while I was competing - competence, compassion and commitment," she said.

Ibasco talked on the importance of being true to one's self in a platform where she is looked up to and can influence a lot of people.

"Compassion in a way that it's important for you not just to be a good person in front of the camera but to be who you are even at the back of the camera."

The Thomasian beauty queen also mentioned the value of competence on reaching one's goal.

"It's one of the most important drives that will also help you to get the best goal or the best aim that you have," lbasco stressed.

Finally, Ibasco stated the importance of consistency and commitment to establishing credibility on her advocacies.

"Consistency is the key that will help you achieve your commitment. At the same time it would help you to be credible as an advocate that people would look up to. So no matter what you say, people will actually listen because you're credible enough and you are committed to what you do," she said.

even Physical Therapy (PT) students namely, Lisa Ann Edwin, Saylee Jadhav, Athira Elizabeth Sebastian, Madhura, Suhas Jamsandekar, Serrao Vaneesa, Aravind Srikumar and Solomon George Raju accompanied by Prof. Ajay Thakur from the Institute of Physiotherapy NITTE University, Mangalore, India participated in the Global Internship Experience (GIE) of the University of Santo Tomas - College of Rehabilitation Sciences (UST-CRS) Department of Physical Therapy from November 22 to December 12, 2017.

The Indian students were grouped into two and were assigned for three to four days in two UST-CRS affiliated rehabilitation centers, namely, Quality Life Discoveries (QLD) and UAAP Sports Center. Under the supervision of staff physical therapists of QLD and UAAP Sports Center, the Indian students observed the evaluation and treatment of musculoskeletal cases, sports - related injuries and pediatric cases in the Philippines.

Aside from clinical observations, there was also an exchange of current practices and knowledge between



ST is once again recognized by the Philippine Association of Colleges and Universities Commission on Accreditation (PACUCOA) as the top university in the Philippines in terms of academic program quality assurance in an awarding ceremony held on December 1, 2017 at the Conrad Hotel in Pasay City during its 28th general assembly.

Bagging a total of seven awards and citations, UST was acknowledged for having the highest number of accredited programs in the National Capital Region and in the Philippines as well as being the University with the highest number of accredited programs under Level IV status in the country.

PACUCOA recognizes UST for highest number of accredited programs

UST's tourism program was also the first in the program to be granted an accreditation under the Level IV status.

The University also garnered special citations for producing graduates who obtained the highest rating in their respective licensure exams, specifically the Pharmacy, Nutrition and Dietetics, and Library Licensure Examinations for 2017.

Currently, 47 academic programs of the University are accredited by PACUCOA, including 26 which are accredited at Level IV, the highest standard of evaluation that PACUCOA gives to institutions of higher learning.

UST CRS- Seton Hall University expand Global Internship Experience to Sports Science Dept.

s part of the Global Internship Experience (GIE) agreement between the University of Santo Tomas-College of Rehabilitation Sciences (UST-CRS) and the Seton Hall University (SHU), four interns from CRS were at the SHU for the entire month of November 2017.

Speech Language Program (SLP) students Marielle Longno and Camille Marcelino together with Sports Science (SpS) students Alliana Mijares and Alexander Villa went to SHU clinical and training facilities in New Jersey and New York, USA, accompanied by CRS Assistant Dean Ma. Georgina Mojica.

Also in November, the interns from the Sports Science Department commenced its affiliation with SHU. Mijares and Villa observed and shadowed the SHU Athletic Trainers in the huge and state-of-the-art sports facilities of SHU. Similar to the SLP and Occupational Therapy (OT) interns, the SpS interns also observed the cases under the Masters in Athletic Training program of SHU. The expansion of partnership aims to produce globally competitive professionals.

This GIE program between the two institutions has been ongoing since January 2015. Two interns from SHU SLP went to Manila for a month to observe the UST-CRS clinical affiliation sites including the community-based rehabilitation service in Abucay, Bataan. This was followed by another set of SHU interns who came in January 2016. By February 2016, the first UST-CRS interns from the SLP program went to SHU for a month to observe clinics, schools and a hospital facility. Aside from the clinical sites, the interns joined the SLP masters class where they had the opportunity to interact with students from SHU. Following a successful pilot run of the GIE both inbound and outbound, it was the turn of the students from the Occupational Therapy Department to engage in the program in November 2017.

LECTURES&CONFERENCES 2018 PALT Int'l Conference tackles language education in Asia



he University of Santo Tomas Department of English and the Philippine Association for Language Teaching, Inc. (PALT) cosponsored the 2017 International Conference with the theme "Language Education in Asia in the Context of ASEAN" held at the Thomas Aguinas Research Center, UST, from December 7 to 9, 2017.

Presenters and speakers tackled issues in language education in relation to the ASEAN experience in various parallel session strands and plenary speeches, such as language policies, English Language Teaching research, teacher beliefs and practices, learner autonomy, teacher preparation, language learning, language assessment, and curriculum development, among others.

As a result of the ASEAN integration, there have been shifts in policies and curricula that have inevitable ripple effects in the field of language teaching. The need to review these effects, infer what they could mean for the stakeholders, and update professionals on current trends has therefore arisen.

Over 150 language teaching professionals and enthusiasts from different countries participated over the course of the three-day international professional gathering, which was held for the first time at the University of Santo Tomas.

"Well, this is really the first time that the PALT [International] Conference went out of its home base." UST Graduate School Dean Marilu R. Madrunio, Ph.D., who is also the incumbent president of PALT, explained. Since the Association's first international conference in 2001, it has normally been held in hotels, such as the Manila Hotel.

Madrunio added that PALT, which was established 57 years ago, is the oldest, professional language teaching organization in the Philippines with whom she and many Filipino English language teachers have spent many active years developing professionally.

PALT has affiliations with other multinational language teaching organizations such as the Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL), and the Pan-Asian Consortium for Language Teaching (PAC). The association is also known to have for its members well-known researchers, a number of whom were its plenary speakers in the threeday conference.

The first plenary speaker was Prof. Maria Cynthia Rose B. Bautista, Vice President for Academic Affairs of the University of the Philippines - Diliman, who discussed the Philippines' changing language education practices in the context of ASEAN.

Dr. Anne Pakir, the National University of Singapore's Director for International Relations talked about "English-knowing Bilingualism", a term primarily applicable in Singapore where the largely Asian population communicates internationally and nationally in English while maintaining usage of their ethnic mother tongues.

For the third plenary speech delivered on the third day of the conference, Assoc. Prof. Ahmar Mahboob of the University of Sydney focused on the role that language plays in education across different pedagogic contexts and tackled the question of whether school-level language textbooks actually prepare students for their future careers.

The other speakers were Mr. Matt Keener, the Cultural Affairs Officer of the US Embassy in the Philippines, Ms. Leonie Overbeek, a language researcher and teacher trainer for Korea -Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages (KoTESOL), and Associate Professor Shirley M. Ando of the Otemae University in Japan. The conference also had over 50 parallel sessions for the different research paper presentations.

Mr. Keener, who tackled the topic of "Maintaining the Philippines' competitive advantage in English," admitted that he is not an expert in English or education in the Philippines.

"I am a diplomat." Keener explained. "If I may be so bold so as to call myself an expert in anything, it would be in using English as a tool for achieving the US State Department's diplomacy goals overseas." he added.

The US invests millions every year in teaching English to other countries in the hope of developing stronger ties with many nations. For some time, the undeniable English proficiency in the Philippines made it one of the world's top providers of voice outsourcing for IT-BPO services, one of the top tourist spots, and the leading preference of English as a Second Language for learners from all over the world. However, Keener also urged curriculum developers and other stakeholders to prioritize English teaching in its education system, as the Philippines cannot simply continue relying on its historical use of English as a primary language.

Participants and quests also had a tour of the UST Museum.

Chavez presented the study "The Effects of Gibney's Closed Basket Weave with Heel Lock and Figure of Eight Technique on the kinematics of the Lower Extremity during the landing phase of vertical jumping among UST UAAP Female Volleyball Players."

The conference was held from November 30 to December 4, 2017 at the Seongseo Campus, Keimyung University, Daegu, South Korea. It was organized by the Asian Society of Kinesiology.

Professor Masayoshi Kubo of Niigata University of Health and Welfare (NUHW), Niigata, Japan, one of the visiting professors of CRS was also a participant. Fernandez and Chavez discussed with Prof. Kubo a potential research collaboration with regarding biomechanics of the human movement.

Attended by students and professors from Thailand, Malaysia, Japan, Singapore, Taiwan, China, Hong Kong, the Philippines and South Korea, the conference was an opportunity for the delegates to share and present their studies in the field of Kinesiology.

Through the conference, participants were able to obtain more ideas and discuss possible research collaborations within Asia. The conference also had workshops, lectures, and symposiums about Human Movement, the theme of this year's conference. The campus tours and a banquet allowed the students and professors socialize with participants from different Asian universities.

This was upon the invitation of Dr. Catherine Crowley, Professor of Practice and Director of the Bilingual Extension Institute at the Teachers College-Columbia University in New York, USA.

As one of the early graduates and practitioners of SLP in the Philippines, Mojica provided the participants with a brief history of SLP in the country, highlighting the establishment of the Bachelor of Science in Speech Language Pathology academic program at the University of Santo Tomas in 2009. She emphasized the ratio of practitioners to the Filipino people with disability needing SLP services, and how in 2014, after UST produced its first graduates and thereafter, the Thomasian SLPs have been steadily providing language pathology services in various work settings locally.

In the facilitated discussion, the students of Columbia University were able to see another perspective of how SLP services are provided considering sociocultural and economic differences between the US and the Philippines.

Mojica and Crowley first met in March 2017 in Manila when Crowley, a renowned educator, conducted a trainors' training for cleft lip and palate patients. Since then, both have been planning for possible collaboration in this area.

tackles Optimising Upper Limb **Functions in Stroke** Rehabilitation

eric Uy, Ph.D., a Physical Therapy academic and clinical instructor at the University CRS seminar U of South Australia specializing in neurologic rehabilitation, was the resource speaker in the seminar titled "Optimising Upper Limb Functions in Stroke Rehabilitations" held in November. The seminar was organized by the Continuing Professional Development Committee of the College of Rehabilitation Sciences (CRS).

> Discussed in the seminar was the current and evidence-based assessment and treatment in upper extremity rehabilitation among stroke patients. This includes nonstandardized and standardized assessment such as postural assessment, upper extremity range of motion, mobility, muscle strength and the use of outcome measure tools. Moreover, the seminar also tackled research-based treatment that participants can use to manage their patients. The speaker, who is a CRS alumnus and former faculty member, used several teaching methodologies to ensure learning among participants like didactics, demonstration and return demonstration. It was attended by 51 licensed physical therapists, three licensed occupational therapists, and two physical therapy interns.
