The precious handwritten volume of the works of Aristotle called *Libro de los piques*¹, which was used for the examination of candidates for the Licentiate and Master of Arts degree, can attest that **St. Catherine of Alexandria** is the patroness of the University of Santo Tomás (UST) since the 17th century. The book, preserved in the UST Archives, has a “cover mounted in silver, the front and back adorned with the symbols of **St. Thomas Aquinas and St. Catherine of Alexandria, patrons of Theology and Philosophy, and of the University.**”²

St. Catherine originated from Alexandria, the academic center of 3rd century Egypt. According to the *Legenda Aurea*, she debated 50 pagan philosophers of the Roman Emperor. Consequently, they lost the intellectual battle but she lost her head. She was sentenced to die on a spiked wheel, but when she was fastened to the wheel, her bonds were miraculously loosened and the wheel itself broke, its spikes flying off and killing some of the onlookers. Eventually, she was beheaded.³

The *Faculty of Philosophy Students' Forum* (FPSF) celebrates the feast of their patroness, St. Catherine of Alexandria, on **25 November 2021** (Thursday), with the theme: “**Philosophers Behind the Screen: Philosophy Engaging in the Present Reality**”.


