# **UST holds first in-person back-to-back Baccalaureate Masses in three years**

fter nearly three academic years of the Enriched Virtual Mode (EVM) of education, the University of Santo Tomas (UST) returned to holding in-person Baccalaureate Masses. The Class of 2022 had their Mass on June 3, 2022, while the Classes of 2020 and 2021 had their Mass on June 4, 2022, both at the UST Open Field and Grandstand.

Following health policies such as presentation of vaccination cards. health declaration via StaySafe.PH or ThoMedSS, wearing of masks, frequent hand sanitization, and thermal screening at the outdoor venue, the graduating students entered the campus for the last time before actual solemn investiture ceremonies.

For the Class of 2022, which had over 9000 graduating students, the Mass Presider and Homilist was the UST Rector Very Rev. Fr. Richard G. Ang, O.P., Ph.D. In his homily, he congratulated the students, saying that, "Each and every one of you

is an achiever, a victor, a high flier, and a hotshot. All of you are equally determined. All of you have worked hard for this, and now that you have attained your goal, each of you deserves to stand tall and be recognized."

For the Classes of 2020 and 2021, it was the UST Vice-Chancellor and the Dominican Province of the Philippines Prior Provincial Very Rev. Fr. Filemon I. dela Cruz, Jr., O.P., who presided over the Mass. He emphasized in his homily that, "We have more reasons to be thankful about, more than your diploma, more than the thought of graduating: We have survived. We have passed through a lot of trials, and I hope we get many lessons from this."

Part of the Post-Mass Program was the annual "Ceremony of Light" that represents UST's mission of illuminating the world through the light of education and evangelization. The flame that originates

from the torch of the Presider is passed on to the torches of the Deans and Regents of the academic units and is received by each of their respective students. They were each given a Thomasian Mission Cross, as a reminder to stay true to Thomasian ideals, even after they leave UST. A recitation of the Thomasian Pledge of Loyalty followed the blessing and imposition of the crosses.

After the Post-Mass Program, the graduating students symbolically left the University in the traditional recessional parade where they exit through the historic Arch of the Centuries, signifying the completion of their student life in UST. The Mass Presider and the Secretary-General, with the administrative and academic officials, led the procession walking out of the Arch,

which was the original gateway of the University when it was still in Intramuros.

The Baccalaureate Masses were the prelude to in-person Completion Ceremonies of Education High School and UST Junior High School, and the Solemn Investiture Rites for Senior High School, Tertiary, Post-Baccalaureate, and Graduate School levels, which were held over the month of June.

In solidarity with the plight of many people, including Thomasians, who are still recovering from the pandemic's ill effects, or who have passed to God's embrace, the Baccalaureate Masses were held solemnly without the traditional pyrotechnics display.

Distinctions were conferred in honor of student achievers from the University of Santo Tomas at the Student Awards Day held on May 31, 2022, through hybrid modality at the UST Quadricentennial Pavilion Arena and livestreamed via the UST Facebook page.

UST Rector Very Rev. Fr. Richard G. Ang, O.P., Ph.D., commended the students and said, "Be proud of what you have achieved, but at the same time, keep your feet firmly planted on the ground. Give thanks to the Lord for His unending grace for you have been blessed to be an instrument of blessing to others."

The Father Rector also emphasized the important role of the parents, guardians, and teachers of the student awardees.

#### Agents of Change

Serving as the guest speaker was Ar. Justin David N. Tan, an alumnus from the Class of 2014 and a topnotch examinee in the 2017 Architect Licensure Examination. Currently, he is a practicing Project Coordinator for Eanovation Inc., an allinclusive home renovation start-up based in San Francisco, California, USA. He was a former President of the UST Architecture Student Council, and a committee chair for the Central Student Council. As a student, he received the Benavides Outstanding Achievement Award in 2012 and the Roque Ruaño Leadership Award in 2014.

Tan, who has been an achiever from a young age, underscored vital aspects of leadership, viewing it as an opportunity to be an agent of change, to be able to contribute to something greater than the self.

"Serving and making a difference – that makes you a leader, not fancy titles or positions. Devote your time in making a difference in the lives of the people around you," said Tan.

Particularly, Tan emphasized the responsibility of leaving a legacy and maximizing the impact of leadership terms, saying that, "Your time in UST is limited. Many of you will soon graduate. You won't always be here to fight the battles you started. You probably won't be here to eat the fruits of the seeds you sow. So you have to inspire others to continue what you began. Because leadership is not about you, not about me, not about ourselves. It is always about all of us."

#### Awards

The top academic achievers from each of the 18 tertiary and postbaccalaureate academic units received the Rector's Academic Award, conferred by the Father Rector Very Rev. Fr. Richard G. Ang, O.P., Ph.D., assisted by the Registrar Mr. Cesar Velasco. The valedictorian for the Class of 2022, who garnered the highest general weighted average at 1.031, was Mr. Louie Rince C. Suyo from the Faculty of Pharmacy.

Delivering the response on behalf of the student awardees, Suyo said, "We are recipients of something to be celebrated and to be shared. The talents and treasures we have must not end with medals and certificates. Let us use our knowledge, skills, and influence to make people's lives better. If we do so, we reinforce a culture of sharing and build a healthy environment for learning."

Thirteen exemplary officers of recognized organizations received the Quezon Leadership Award for their service, including Qjiel Giuliano Mikhl Z. Mariano from the College of Nursing who engaged collaborations for the 2021 Institute of Technical Education (ITE) College Singapore Virtual Global Education Programme to the Philippines in partnership with Dunman High School of Singapore.

Another award, the Pope Leo XIII Community Development Award, was given to three students and three organizations for their outstanding involvement in community development. Among the recipients was Charles Kevin Mina for adding a new partner community and increasing the number of scholars supported by BUTIL (Bonded University Towards Imbued Learning) to 100.

### CTHM and GS-CCCPET forge three sustainable partnerships for the UST Sentro Turismo, Eastern Visayas Food Mapping Project

The UST College of Tourism and Hospitality Management (CTHM) forged three sustainable partnerships through the signing of a Memorandum of Agreement and Terms of Reference. The ceremony was held on June 1, 2022 (Wednesday) at the Multi-purpose Hall, 8/F, Bl. Buenaventura G. Paredes, O.P. Building.

### UST and the Association of Tourism Officers of the Philippines, Inc. (ATOP)

The agreement involves the implementation of a collaborative engagement between ATOP, UST CTHM, and the Graduate School – Center for Conservation of Cultural Property and Environment in the Tropics (GS-CCCPET), on an exclusive basis, to develop a physical library hub and maintain the digital and website platform for the Pearl Awards Nomination Book and other related materials.

ATOP will turnover existing and future materials (raw images, text, videos, audio, etc.) to UST CTHM and GS-CCCPET for on-site and digital documentation and safekeeping. Additionally, for the University to provide accessibility of the library hub and website to potential researchers and academicians as approved by ATOP and concerned LGUs.

GS-CCCPET will provide exclusive copies of the natural and cultural heritage mapping and other related materials to CTHM for safekeeping as part of the Tourism Center – Library Hub. In turn, CTHM will provide a physical room and a technical staff to support the safekeeping of the materials retrieved by GS-CCCPET.

#### Kulinarya Silangan: The Eastern Visayas Food Mapping Project

Kulinarya Silangan, a major campaign for the region, is a food mapping documentation on the six provinces of Eastern Visayas, namely, Northern Samar, Eastern Samar, Samar, Biliran, Leyte, and Southern Levte. It will focus on three strands of Eastern Visavan foods such as dishes (pagkaon), rice cakes (suman), and sweets (tinam-isan). The objectives of this project are as follows: to identify and document the distinct dishes (pagka-on), rice cakes (suman), and sweets (tinamisan) of the region; to develop a database of metanarratives that will facilitate research and studies on food anthropology and functional disciplines such as health, agriculture, tourism, education, product development, and others; to conduct a series of seminars, workshops, and

### **CCWLS director Hidalgo in 2022 top scientific index**

mong the top research scientists included in the Jan. 29, 2022 rankings of the Alper-Doger (AD) Scientific Index is UST Center for Creative Writing and Literary Studies (CCWLS) Director Cristina Pantoja Hidalgo, PhD, who was cited for her research on women's literature, autobiographical writing by women, and Philippine literature in English.

The AD Scientific Index uses the total and last five years' values of the author impact index and citation scores from Google Scholar to rank scientists by subject, institution, country, region, and in the world according to scientific performance and the added value of the scientific productivity.

Hidalgo, who holds a doctorate degree in comparative literature, is also a Professor Emeritus of English and Comparative Literature at the University of the Philippines (UP).

Among the many awards she has received are the Gawad Balagtas, Gawad Dangal ng Lahi, and three Carlos Palanca Memorial Awards for Literature, including the Grand Prize for the Novel in 1996 for Recuerdo. She has also been recognized as an Outstanding Thomasian Writer and an International Publication Award Hall of Famer

Hidalgo has published more than 40 books, including novels, short story and CNF collections, and autobiographical travel books. Her works on literary criticism and research focusing on women's literature have contributed greatly to local and international feminist scholarship.

Her latest book, What I Wanted to be When I Grew Up, released by UP Press in May 2022, is a memoir that traces the effects on her life of the books she read and movies she watched from childhood to high school.

### Leading musicologist speaks at **USTGS 2022 St. Antoninus of Florence Lecture**

isten with the eyes and see with " the ears," said Dr. Felicidad Prudente, a leading Filipina musicologist, who gave a talk at the UST Graduate School's St. Antoninus of Florence Lecture on May 7, 2022. Her lecture was titled "From Concept to Praxis: The Making of Textile Art from Weaving Sounds."

Prudente argued that weaving sounds are not just noise but integral to the production of textile art. They are embodied sounds brought about by the physicality of the weaver's body attached to the loom. making them one. Sound studies connect with visual art, the art of weaving, and even mathematics in the counting of rhythmic patterns and the endless counting of threads. The uncharted world of weaving sound becomes a multidisciplinary field that merges sound, image, performance, tradition, and technology in collaboration with visual artist Gerardo Tan and Ifugao master weaver Sammy Bule.

The speaker discussed how the weaver now becomes a musical performer with the loom as her musical instrument and projects herself sonically in her own style of handling the loom. The performer deploys and controls her tools at her own pace and rhythm, which generates sound patterns until the cloth is finished. It is like a musician who concludes the piece upon reaching its end.

In her insightful talk, Prudente also provided a modified definition of "translation," which is now multidisciplinary and not solely confined to language. It is "carrying over" the intangible to the tangible, the transcribed

### **UST infectious disease webinar** underscores antimicrobial resistance

ST Graduate School Ph.D. major in Medical Technology students, in collaboration with the Continuing Professional Development Committee of the Faculty of Pharmacy Medical Technology Department, held a webinar titled "Diagnosis of Infectious Disease Agents and Antimicrobial Resistant Genes" on May 20, 2022.

Experts in the field of infectious diseases and bioinformatics were invited to discuss some key and novel points regarding antimicrobial resistance contextualized in the Philippines, and the possible role of molecular and bioinformatics techniques in diagnostics of resistance.

Assoc. Prof. Maria Rhona G. Bergantin, M.D., M.Sc., FPCP, FPSMID of the UST Hospital discussed "Antimicrobial Resistance (AMR) Surveillance in the Healthcare Setting: Unveiling the Secrets of AMR - A Journey to Disarm Superbugs." In this presentation, Bergantin focused on the mechanisms through which bacteria acquire antimicrobial resistance. She exposed the role of resistance networks on the transmission of AMR bacteria (ARB), as being driven by interactions among host, pathogen and environmental factors, including the role of hospital wastewater as a significant environmental reservoir of AMR, as it represents an ideal environment for ARB and antimicrobial resistant genes (ARGs) to persist. She also touched on the effects of antimicrobial resistance as a major issue posing a serious global health threat especially in low-income countries like the Philippines, and the treatment processes that can help in eliminating or reducing the ARB load and its impact on ARGs in a public health setting.

Assoc. Prof. Thaddeus M. Carvajal, Ph.D. of the De La Salle University College of Science, tackled the topic,

"Computational Design for Molecular Diagnosis of Infectious Agents," which highlighted cutting-edge research that brings an opportunity for current and future researchers to be abreast on the novel technologies and approaches in molecular studies with the aid of bioinformatics. He gave examples of his collaboration with Japanese agencies and academia in which molecular techniques including methods like Sanger sequencing and next generation sequencing, and the expanding of research from genomics to full on systematics were used to help with the prevention of mosquito-borne viral infections.

The webinar was attended by over 520 participants, including medical technologists/clinical laboratory scientists currently working in clinical laboratories in the Philippines, faculty members from different universities, Medical Technology students, and researchers in the field of Clinical Microbiology.

Also present during the program were Prof. Edilberto P. Manahan, Ph.D., Chair of the Department of Medical Technology and Prof. Camilla J. Vizconde, Ph.D., Assistant Dean of the UST Graduate School.

### Franchising professionals share insights on managing franchise businesses at GS webinar

he UST Graduate School – Business Cluster organized the webinar "Game Plan: Winning Strategies in Business Franchising," which highlighted the concepts of franchising along with its advantages, challenges, and strategies.

Business Cluster Program Lead, Dr. Elizabeth O. Recio, stated in her welcome remarks that having the topic was timely, since shifting from being a wage earner to having an enterprise or franchise is one of the many avenues that can be explored by an individual to succeed and start moving away from the economically devastating effects of the pandemic and other currents events.

UST Graduate School Dean Prof. Michael Anthony C. Vasco, Ph.D., stated that franchising is one the many ways of expanding our economic base, capitalizing on the success of the already wellestablished businesses, extending it to other locations. This in turn will not only generate income for the owner, but also employment opportunities for others.

The three speakers were professionals who are directly involved with the daily operations of franchising; Ms. Wendy Molina, Operations and Marketing Head of Old Baguio Café and Ms. Lutchie Canlas, Co-founder and Business Development Head of Bang Bang Special Crispy Bangus. They were joined by an expert in developing the biggest franchise brands in the country, Mr. Joselito Samson, Assistant Vice President for Consultancy of Francorp Philippines.

Molina started by introducing Old Baguio Café as it prides itself as a gourmet experience with the best of Cordillera brews and hospitality, a 'piece of Baguio in the heart of the Metro'. Being a social enterprise at the same time, it promotes sustainability, traceability, and authenticity in their products. As one of the restaurants that launched during the pandemic, Molina shared that they saw the pandemic as an opportunity even amidst the continuous travel restrictions and lockdowns by strategizing into

making Old Baguio Café a solution to state the needs of craving the spirit of Baquio.

Canlas, co-founder of Bang Bang Special Crispy Bangus, discussed how they focused their strategy on revamping the normal fried Bangus that Filipinos are used to. Apart from the original flavor, they have introduced new tastes that are close to the Filipino palate such as Spicy Pares and Inasal. With a great business plan and intriguing marketing strategy, they have managed to increase their branches nationwide. When asked about how they maintain quality despite swift growth, she said that they made sure that the process is kept simple, which helps ensure quality and consistency. She also highlighted four points that aimed to answer the question 'how to keep winning when the game rules changed' through the acronym BANG: Be bullish. Accept realities. Navigate opportunities. Gear up for the next challenge.

Considering that the majority of the participants were students. the final speaker focused on laving out the basics of franchising. Samson emphasized the essence of equilibrium between the franchisee and the franchisor, ensuring that both will profit.

Samson shared that not all businesses are franchise ready. He explained various criteria that help determine franchisability of a business: successful prototype, continuing value, return on investment, affordability, market trends and conditions, capital requirements, adaptability, transferability of knowledge, differentiation, and credibility. He also advised to look into aspects such as structure, legal, operations, marketing, and sales.

The webinar ended with closing remarks from Dr. Fernando L. Trinidad, who noted the emerging interest of students in franchising. He said that it might seem like a road paved with gold but along the way, there are still 'holes' which require strategizing for one to survive.

### UST Pharmacy, GS collaborate with Mahidol **University on Leptospirosis Diagnostics webinar**

UST Graduate School (GS) he and the Continuing Professional Development (CPD) committee of the Department of Medical Technology of the Faculty of Pharmacy, through the class of Prof. Edilberto P. Manahan, Ph.D., under MT 820 (Graduate Seminar), organized the webinar "Diagnosis of Leptospirosis: Development of Test Kits" on April 12, 2022. via Zoom.

"Research in healthcare is an essential function that all higher education institutions must pursue. With the backdrop of emerging diseases, the more that we realize that we need to advance, push, and expand the frontiers of research in the health sciences so that we can address the pressing needs of our communities and society," said GS Dean Prof. Michael Anthony Vasco, Ph.D., in his opening remarks.

Attended by various allied healthcare professionals working in the industry and academe, the webinar had Assoc. Prof. Kulachart Jangpatarapongsa, Ph.D., from the Mahidol University Center for Research and Innovation as the speaker. He shared his expertise on leptospirosis diagnostics, owing to the fact that the said disease has had a significant increase in both incidence and mortality rates in the Philippines for the past years, with farming communities in the Cordilleras seeing a rapid rise.

Jangpatarapongsa, whose expertise spans different biological fields, including parasitology, immunology, and diagnostics, shared several key components of developing a diagnostic kit for the diagnosis of leptospirosis, scaling up the production of said kits, and setting up of

be highly involved in production.

In his talk, he first introduced the bacterium, followed by the process of infection with *Leptospira*, the segments of the population vulnerable to the disease, and epidemiologic consequences such as 50,000 people dying of leptospirosis every year. Considering that bacterium is zoonotically transmitted through the urine of animals like rats that mix with flood waters (a scenario common in the Philippines), the speaker emphasized that early treatment is key in preventing severe infections. Hence, the development of detection kits with high sensitivity and specificity serves a crucial purpose in the early detection and treatment of such disease.

The kits (detecting early antibodies), according to Jangpatarapongsa, are necessary because gold standard or reference methods prove to consequential drawbacks. have Microagglutination testing (MAT) is less sensitive in early cases, polymerase chain reaction (PCR) machines cannot be taken to the field and remain expensive, and bacteria cultures take a long time despite being definitive.

During the open forum, Jangpatarapongsa offered Filipino researchers the great opportunity to partner with Mahidol in identifying species under the genus Leptospira; and serovars using their Thai labs. The Thai-developed kits detect both immunoglobulin antibodies, IgM and IgG, using enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay (ELISA), and were later expanded to IgM immunochromatographic lateral tests for rapid detection. Studies on the rapid

business models for which academia can

test kit have proven that it is comparable in accuracy as the gold standard, PCR, in detecting earlier stages of infections, especially in cases of emergencies, and are therefore of great use for screening. The speaker stressed that this opens the door for the Philippines to develop its own test kits catering to the serovars of Leptospira in the Philippines as this affects specificity.

Another important aspect tackled by Jangpatarapongsa is how he, together with other members of his team, vastly contributed to developing a means by which their product can be profitable. These include discussions on upstreaming, which uses basic and applied research on proof of concept; middle streaming, which includes product design, development, and production among others; and market validation and commercialization as facets of downstreaming.

Jangpatarapongsa and his team developed IgM against specific antigens of Leptospira, worked on several series of specificity testing, reliability, and product stability validation; performed cost effectiveness studies; and came up with enquiries on target customers, and business-to-business plans that involved manufacturers (MT innotrex co., LTD), the academe (Mahidol University), and Thailand's Ministry of Public Health.

Ending the talk with an open forum, it was discussed that a similar process must be followed (adapted to prevailing conditions) in order to produce a Philippinemade test kit mirroring the work of our Southeast Asian neighbors.

### Industry experts share business, marketing strategies at UST GS webinar

hree entrepreneurs who were able to rise above the challenges of the global pandemic shared their experiences on the Zoom webinar organized by the Entrepreneurial Marketing and Strategies out four reasons businesses fail -lack class on April 30, 2022.

Titled "RISE: Recalibrate vour Entrepreneurial Strategy," the webinar centered on how businessmen can maximize opportunities, manage risks, and be innovative to thrive within their chosen businesses. There were three invited speakers in the symposium.

The first speaker was an Entrepreneur, the DTI and Go Negosyo mentor Mr. John Paul "PJ" Lanot, followed by UST alumnus and the Global Director for Sales Excellence of Ortho Clinical Diagnostic Mr. Ban Joseph Ang, and former ABS-CBN artist, CEO and Co-Founder of Shoppertainment Live Inc., Hiyasmin Neri-Soyao.

Lanot discussed maximizing opportunities by listening to what your customers need and redesigning your business based on what suits the market. He shared that he was able to apply this to his own business during the pandemic by being flexible and adaptive to the changes

in his environment. He emphasized starting small to expand the business gradually.

Ang's talk focused on managing risk while starting a business. He pointed of operational cash flow, low customer demand, inadequate management, and ineffective business planning. For better and innovative management, he recommended leveraging the team's strengths and putting the best people on the biggest opportunities, not the biggest problems. Ang urged listeners to "identify your shortterm and long-term business goals, focus on what capabilities, resources, and skills you currently have, and then build your goals. Most importantly, stay with your core business intent."

Neri-Soyao talked about "Rising Innovation: Shopping in a Livestream Industry". With her years of experience in hosting a home shopping show, she saw the gap in the entertainment market of home shopping. She acquired sponsors and built her own company that started only with three employees but grew to 60 employees in the middle of the pandemic. She continues to innovate her way through

e-commerce using online platforms.

As an additional feature, interviews were conducted with various micro and small entrepreneurs who were also able to innovate, transform and recalibrate their strategies during the pandemic as an additional source of knowledge for the audience. A panel discussion followed the series of talks with the three speakers. As a parting message, Lanot, Ang, and Neri-Soyao highlighted the significance of having a mentor who can contribute wisdom and experience to a start-up business.

The event was attended by 272 participants from the academe and business community and was watched by over 1,000 people via Facebook Live. This event was opened with a message from Graduate School Dean Prof. Michael Anthony Vasco, Ph.D. and was concluded with the remarks of the Business Cluster Program Lead for Graduate School Prof. Elizabeth Recio, Ph.D. It was organized by the whole class of Entrepreneurial Marketing and Strategies with the course facilitator Prof. Esmeraldo Dimaculangan Jr., Ph.D.

n line with its mission to celebrate and promote Philippine literature and writers. the UST Center for Creative Writing and Literary Studies (CCWLS) continues to produce its popular podcast 'USTinig' that debuted at the height of the pandemic.

The first episode of the Center's official podcast was aired in August 2020 and featured Edgar Calabia Samar, who discussed his novel Teorya ng Unang Panahon.

CCWLS Director Professor Emeritus Cristina Pantoja Hidalgo, Ph.D., is proud of what the 'USTinig' team has achieved in terms of the quality of its content. "It is several notches above much stuff that is on the 'Net," she said. "Its content is original and engaging, and the team has tried to give it popular appeal.

Feedspot.com, in its May 29, 2022 ranking of best writing podcasts, places 'USTinig' at #13 among "thousands of podcasts on the web ranked by traffic, social media followers, domain authority, and freshness." Metroscenemag.com last year included the show among its choice of five local podcasts on literature.

#### Show format, hit episodes

'USTinig,' hosted by creative writing instructor Mr. Jose Mojica, has two types of episodes: 'RTs' or Reading Texts, which features a creative work such as a book, play, or movie, and the author reading an excerpt; and 'DMs' or Discussion Matters, which is a conversation with a writer about their work, writing process, and other topics related to creative writing.

In 2021, a lively and engaging segment hosted by Asst. Prof. Dawn Marfil-Burris was added to the show. The other segments are the "USTinig Questionnaire," patterned after Vanity Fair's Proust Questionnaire, and "Save, Edit, and Delete," where the quest is asked their opinion about a popular cultural product or phenomenon and asked whether they will save (the best), edit ("puwede na"), or delete (below par).

### Thomasians curate an exhibit on **20th Century Intramuros architecture**

National Heritage Month, or Thomasian alumni Prince Wico Rancho Arcilla curated an and exhibition on the architecture of 20th century Intramuros. Stemming from Wico's undergraduate thesis, the National Commission for Culture and the Arts (NCCA) housed "Istilong Intramuros: Identity by the Turn of the 20th Century" at their gallery from May 10 to 31, 2022.

Since the contemporary design style in the Walled City is inspired by the Spanishera colonial style, little is known about the architecture of the district after the Spanish occupation. With this, the exhibition is an attempt to shed light on the district's architecture focusing on the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century. It is important to note that architectural gems during this time were mostly destroyed during the Second World War, except for the San Agustin Church.

The exhibit, which is based on a book that is currently in development, aims to bridge the gap in the understanding and appreciation of Intramuros' unique character and stylistic identity by the end of the Spanish colonial regime. The exhibit is divided into two major parts: Housing the People, which explores the Bahay na Bato, its indigeneity, as well as its place as the prevailing architecture of Intramuros; and Housing God and King, which presents how power and dominance is projected in the churches, state buildings, palaces, and the fortifications of the Walled City .

Prince Wico is a Class of 2021 graduate from the University of Santo Tomas College of Architecture, and as an emerging professional in heritage work, he promotes the importance of contemporary innovation in the treatment of historic fabric.



Rancho Arcilla currently heads the Archives of the Intramuros Administration in Manila. Concurrent to this position, he also serves at the panel of the Intramuros Technical Committee on Architectural Standards, the review board of IA on all matters of new constructions in Intramuros.

He has an MA in Philippine Studies from the University of the Philippines Diliman and a BA in Asian Studies from the University of Santo Tomas.



### **CCWLS Resident Fellow Chuck Pascual translates** 4 works by Cristina Pantoja Hidalgo

ST Center for Creative Writing and Literary Studies (CCWLS) Resident Fellow Assoc. Prof. Chuckberry J. Pascual, Ph.D., has brought to four his translations of works by noted essayist and fictionist Prof. Cristina Pantoia Hidalgo. Ph.D.

To be published next year by the UST Publishing House (UST PH) is Pascual's latest translation into Filipino of Hidalgo, her Tales for a Rainy Night (1993) under the title Mga Kuwentong Bayan para sa Gabing Maulan.

His translations of her Where Only the Moon Rages (1994) as Sa Bayan ng Nagngangalit na Buwan, and Ballad of a Lost Season (1987) as Kundiman ng Panahong Naiwan, were published by UST PH in July 2021, while the Filipino version of

Pascual is an awarded essayist, fictionist, and literary critic. He teaches literature and creative writing at the UST Graduate School and Faculty of Arts and Letters. He has written 13 books and coedited many anthologies.

Hidalgo, who is the Center's director, is a pioneer in the writing, teaching, and promotion of the creative nonfiction (CNF) genre in the Philippines. She has published over 40 books of fiction, CNF, and literary criticism.

#### The significance of memory in literature

Pascual, long a fan of Hidalgo's works, said he chose to translate her books and make them accessible to a wider Filipino audience because he believes they are a significant reminder of the importance of memory and narrative in literature toward the shaping of a nationalistic and feminist social identity.

"Binabasa ko talaga si Ma'am Jing [Hidalgo's nickname] dati pa," Pascual said. "At formative din ang mga kuwento niya sa akin bilang manunulat, kaya karangalan ko nang pumayag siyang isalin ko ang mga akda niya sa Filipino."

[I have been reading Ma'am Jing ever since, and her stories were formative to me as a writer, and so I was honored that she agreed to let me translate her works into Filipino.]

In a critical essay for the UST PH translations, he wrote: "Sa kabuuan, maaaring ilarawan ang mga akda ni

pinakahamahalagang kontribusyon ni Hidalgo ay ang pagpapahalaga sa gunita. ang walang tigil niyang pagpapaalala na dapat tayong umalala, at huwag na huwag makakalimot--sa mga kuwento ng kababaihan, sa mga kuwento ng bayan."

[Overall, Hidalgo's works may be described as nationalistic, feminist, and experimental...But perhaps the most important contributions of Hidalgo are the value she places on memory and her constant reminders that we should always remember and never ever forget - the stories of women, the stories of the nation.]

Pascual wrote Kumpisal: Mga Kuwento (UST PH, 2015), Pagpasok sa Eksena: Ang Sinehan sa Panitikan at Pag-aaral ng Piling Sinehan sa Recto (UP Press, 2016), Ang Nawawala (Visprint Inc., 2017), and a translation of Miguel Syjuco's 2010 novel Ilustrado (UST PH. 2022), among others.

His forthcoming titles this year are Bayan ng mga Bangkay, a horror/crime short story collection (UP Press), and two volumes of the Maramihan anthologies coedited with Dr. Rolando Tolentino (Ateneo de Manila University Press).

Pascual has won many awards, among them the Dangal ng UST Gawad San Alberto Magno for Best Book and Best Published Research in 2019 and Best Creative Work in 2017; and Best Book of Short Fiction in Filipino, National Book Development Board/Manila Critics Circle 2018 National Book Awards for Ang Nawawala.
